JUNE 2012 FLOODING INCIDENT UPDATE TO ELECTED COUNCIL MEMBERS AND TOWN AN DPARISH OFFICERS AT 3 JULY 2012

Community and Communicating with the public

The National Flood Forum (NFF) Trailer, supported by Arun District Council (ADC) staff, Southern Water Representatives and Environment Agency staff, have completed attendance at flood affected areas at one day per week at six locations.

The NFF estimate that 500 people, including those from Bracklesham, have attended at the Trailer.

Additional dates for road side NFF Trailer availability at Elmer / Littlehampton to provide additional advice to the public are:12/13, 19/20, 26/27, July and 2/3 of August.

The emerging themes reported from the NFF Trailer are:

- If I am not in my property do I have to pay Council Tax?
- The use and availability of sandbags
- Reports of local businesses (hotels) 'upping' prices
- Why did agencies not respond sooner?
- No insurance
- Homelessness
- Emotional Trauma
- Business (Rogue) touting

The longer term issues reported are around:

- Drain Maintenance
- Riparian Ownership
- · Effect of new development

Packs with posters and information about the NFF vehicle and contacts with agencies and the Frequently Asked Questions are being supplied to Parish Clerks and churches in the affected districts to help information get to local communities as well.

Southern Water have created a Flood Recovery management group and working groups and the structure from them is in place to support recovery efforts, they have been collating data on affected properties to help inform any communications strategies moving forward.

ADC Communications Team have been working on updates posted to the ADC website, Twitter feeds and the media and there has been significant local coverage of the floods and the recovery in the local press.

There has been some reported confusion from residents over 'loss adjusters' and 'loss assessors' and clarification of these is included in the Frequently Asked Questions posted online and to all partners in the recovery process.

The Frequently Asked Questions are being updated in line with contacts being made with agencies in the recovery phase and these will be more focussed on the longer term questions that are coming from residents.

The NFF aims to establish progression to Community Action Groups in the affected areas. These groups can start to prepare community flood action plans and those relevant agencies can be utilised to support as required.

Citizens Advice have had limited contacts from the public and have only had some specific enquiries in relation to accessing transport to school when households have moved from one town to another by insurance companies etc.

There have not been any reports from Sussex Police or West Sussex Trading Standards of any rogue traders in the flooded areas but the presence of Sussex Police in the area will continue.

The Council's communications team continue to develop and provide updates published on the Council's website, Twitter feeds and the media although, this week, there has been significantly less interest from the media.

Impact

Current reports of flooded roads indicate more than 61 roads in Arun District had some level of surface and/or property flooding.

Extent of the flooding is being collated at present and as part of a West Sussex wide view, current indications show that over 400 properties may have experienced flooding to some extent in West Sussex and a summary of the data gathered so far is listed in figure 1. Clarification of this data is still underway.

Waste, contamination Cleansing Operations

Council placed 35 skips in the roads impacted by the flooding with many around Elmer and Middleton. Southern Water placed eight skips in the area with two in South Terrace, Littlehampton.

The Council's Cleansing Operations Team and Southern Water have one skip left in place but are experiencing a small number of properties that are still clearing flood damaged property from them and require disposal. Such instances are being dealt with by the waste team on a case by case basis.

The estimated number of black sacks of waste removed from the skips is 3,000. Extra support and extra sack collections in some areas have been instigated to ensure waste is collected promptly.

The Environment Agency and the Council are continuing to monitor the quality of the bathing water and generally advise there is no threat.

All roads and pavements have been cleared and cleaned by Council Cleansing teams.

Housing

ADC Housing Management Services have had 40 approaches requiring assistance. Most of these have been in terms of advising regarding insurance.

Temporary overnight accommodation was provided but insurance companies have taken over responsibility for these residents invoices.

One person had been offered assistance but declined. Subsequently, support by the Council's housing options team has been provided.

Three households are still being accommodated by the Council but work is progressing to enable them to return to their properties as soon as possible.

There have been reports of delays in accessing the insurance company's assessors, in one case they will not be able to attend before 9th July.

Voluntary Sector/vulnerable groups

Those identified as vulnerable from the West Sussex County Council Vulnerable People plan have all now had contact by the Sussex Police, Health Services, Arun District Council or West Sussex Social Care.

There have been some more individuals identified that require support from attendance at the National Flood Forum trailer and these are being followed up.

British Red Cross (BRC) continues to coordinate offers of goods and monetary donations from individuals and is maintaining links with RAYDAR and Homelink in Littlehampton that have received donated goods. BRC continues to match requests to offers where appropriate.

The British Red Cross met with the Council to consider arrangements for a Relief Fund to manage monetary donations for those affected by the flooding. The British Red Cross have agreed to manage any relief fund account with administration of any fund being by a Steering Group consisting of two ADC representatives, two Red Cross representatives and a representative from Arun's communities. However with a total of £13 having been received to date it is unlikely that a relief fund will be set up.

Recovery coordination

There is a daily internal Council recovery group meeting to review progress and current focus and issues. These are supported by weekly multi-agency recovery group meetings at Bognor Town Hall.

The impact of the floods on the Olympic Torch Relay route has been considered but it does not appear the flooding will affect any of the arrangements Torch Relay but remains a consideration.

Considerable advice and assistance has been given to Arun by many agencies and particularly by WSCC Emergency Management Team including the secondment of Dave Nelson on a full time basis, the work initiating and supporting the National Flood Forum Trailer around the District by Dave Bonner and Jo Higgs of the Environment Agency's Solent and South Downs Office including working without a break during the Trailers' attendance at the different locations, similarly the non stop attendance at the NFF Trailer by Heather Shepherd of the NFF and the support provided by Southern Water.

Ferring Neighbourhood Plan - Report of the Drainage and Flooding Working Group

1. SCOPE

To investigate the risk of flooding (sea, river, rainwater and ground water) and ensure appropriate plans are in place to manage the risk and mitigate the impacts of any flooding.

To investigate the utility infrastructure provision (waste water, storm water) and ensure capacity is appropriate for planned development.

2. CONCLUSIONS & RECOMMENDATIONS

In the light of our investigations, described in Appendix 1, our conclusions and recommendations are as follows:

- Planning and Building Regulations:- Recommendation to Ferring Parish Council that all Planning applications for individual property comply with the following check list:- How surface water is to be disposed of effectively either to surface water sewer or properly designed soak-away.
- 2. <u>Planning and Building Regulations</u>:- Recommendation to Ferring Parish Council that all new developments with a discharge into a sewer or to the Rife must incorporate SUDS drainage. Plus that existing drainage channels and ditches are operational and effective.
- 4. <u>Ferring Parish Council</u>:- must pursue West Sussex County Council in the clearance and maintenance of the Sea Lane outfall pipe.
- 5. The Rife:- That Ferring Parish Council nominates one Parish Councillor to ensure that the Environment Agency carry out constant essential maintenance on Flap valves weed clearance along the length of the Rife. Plus, the visual inspection of all piped access points into the Rife in conjunction with Land owners. The Parish Council should look regularly at all Developments that drain into the Rife (upstream) to ensure regular maintenance on working procedures. (This can be by inspecting/receiving visual report records carried out by the appointed agents).
- Southern Water:- That the Ferring Parish Council approach Southern Water to see the results of the
 condition surveys of pressure mains and if deterioration of the mains has been identified establish
 what actions are to be taken.
- 7. <u>Southern Water</u>:- Ferring Parish Council to establish via SW what type of overflow exists at Onslow Drive pumping station.
- 8. <u>Southern Water</u>:- Ferring Parish Council to establish via SW the outcome of the mathematical Model exercise of the area and for a presentation to be given of the outcome to the Council.
- 9. <u>Emergency Procedures</u> Ferring Parish Council should increase awareness of the EA flood warning service.
- 10. <u>Ferring Parish Council</u>:- To undertake a soil sample survey across the village to identify where additional soak aways could be effectively provided.
- 11. Ferring Roads Association:- That the association should look to provide additional soak ways within their areas of responsibility to provide a "mini sustainable Urban Drainage System (SUDS)" system to alleviate standing water, and help with the unauthorised removal of land ditches by owners as Ferring has developed.
- 12. <u>Ferring Parish Council:</u> should encourage all residents to be part a roads maintenance scheme. This would ensure that drainage and roads are effective across the whole village as the area is a shared land system and no area exists in isolation.
